

Supplemental Material for *Granite Guide to Early Childhood: What Do New Hampshire Families Want for Child Care?*

- 1.** Analysis of the National Survey of Children’s Health (NSCH) from 2021 and 2022 shows that 56 percent of children age 0–5 in New Hampshire utilized at least 10 hours of non-parental care per week. No child-level comparator on use of **any care** is available in the NSCH for corroboration.
- 2.** Utilization of care by type and child age via Carsey School of Public Policy analysis of U.S. Census Bureau, Household Pulse Survey, Phases 3.6–3.8 (Weeks 49–57).
- 3.** Figure 1 includes 567 households that reported using child care in the past seven days. Respondents from these households were shown a series of arrangements and asked to select all child care arrangements used in the past seven days. Those who selected more than one type of provider were coded as using “multiple” arrangements. Estimates were calculated using household-level replicate weights.
- 4.** Figure 2 includes responses from 548 parents who searched for care at least once in their child's life and use a care arrangement.
