What is Civic Health?




Civic Health Can Include

- Belonging







NH Residents Feel They Matter Less.

- Mattering fell 30 percentage points from 2019 to 2023
- Mattering was different by age and region

We're Connecting Less With Others. (2019 to 2021)

 NH residents who do favors for their neighbors fell from 11% to 5%


 Granite Staters hear from or spend time with friends and family less – from 85% to 81%

 People are working less with neighbors to do positive things for the community, from 27% to 21%.

NH Residents Attend Public Meetings Less.

- From 2019 to 2021, NH residents' public meeting attendance dropped from 19 to 12%.
- We are still above national averages.

New Hampshire

Over Half of NH Residents Engage Across Race, Ethnicity, or Culture.

• 53% engaged frequently with people of a different racial, ethnic, or cultural background than their own

Older people are doing this less.

 People ages 35-49 engaged across differences at 63% compared with 30% of those 65 or older.

Voting Has Some Highs and Lows.

 NH residents voted at higher rates than the rest of the nation in national elections (2020, 2022) Urban residents voted less than suburban or rural residents in national elections in 2020

 76 % or rural people voted in the 2020 election compared with 57% of urban residents

Trust in National and Local Government Dropped Since 2001 and Has Stayed Low.

- Trust in national government has fallen dramatically since 2001, from 31% to 17%.
- Only 1% of NH residents trust the national government all of the time.
- 49% almost never trust the national government.
- Trust in national government was about the same in 2019 as it is in 2024.

- Trust in local government has also fallen from 2001, from 53% to 36% in 2024.
- Trust in local government was about the same from 2019 to 2024.

We Measured Belonging for the First Time. Here's What We Learned.

- 49% of NH residents feel they belong in their local community.
- 55% felt satisfied with their relationships with others in their local community.

- 59% felt comfortable expressing their opinions in their local community.
- 62% feel connected to their local community.

There Don't Seem to Be Impacts on Volunteering and Giving.

 There were no significant changes in volunteering and giving from 2019 to 2021. Educational levels, age, and income all are associated with volunteering and giving.
